On various occasions the Senate pursuant to a previous order has met for very brief periods and recessed over until a subsequent date, not in excess of 3 days. For example, on August 31, 1949, the Senate was in session for only 40 seconds, and on October 20, 1977, it was for only 30 seconds.2 On February 27, 1989, the Senate was in session for only six-tenths of a second.3
